The emphasis is on making music together as a group - joining in and having the opportunity to lead or add your own flavour to the mix. Murray Kilpatrick will facilitate but everyone will have the opportunity to lead a song or tune.

President's Report (as presented to the AGM)

As this will be my last President's report I am pleased to report another good year for the club. Membership is up and attendances at events have been very strong (with a few unfortunate exceptions). We have again added to the clubs regular calendar of meetings by restoring Friday club nights once a month in a mixed Blackboard concert / jam session format.

Financially we have again incurred a small loss – mainly due to increased costs. The committee has taken steps to address this by raising membership subscriptions (as approved at last year's AGM) and also raising admission prices slightly and increasing the differential between member and non member admission prices. These changes should avoid the need to increase prices again – but were not introduced early enough to give any benefit in the year under review.

Thanks to Murray Kilpatrick for writing a controversial and thought provoking letter to members through the Balladeer. This started a series of exchanges (mainly by email) and an extensive review of the club activities and purpose. A working group was formed (myself, Dale Lacey, Col Wright and Murray) and with input from lots of others we made a number of recommendations to the Committee. Some of these recommendations have been implemented while others remain as guiding ideas in developing our events programme.

Club concerts and events

Our fifth Sunday Blackboard concerts have again delivered some great evenings. As noted above we have added yet another regular event in the form of a Club Night on the 2nd Friday of each month. Participative events, as always, have proved popular and we have seen a number of new (and young) performers join the club's activities this year.

Once again thanks to the Wellington Museums Trust and Anne McGregor who have who have continued to involve us (and our

performing members) in their public programme of events. In this new club year it has been a pleasure to be part of an extended series of 18 concerts over 9 Sundays during July and August. These events have been well supported and again give us a great opportunity to connect with people outside the "folk scene".

The Singers' Club

The Singers Club merged with Acoustic Routes at the last AGM, but remained largely autonomous under the guidance of Tony Hillyard and the Singers Club residents. Due to format and venue issues the Singers Club is now on hold but it may return when and if a better venue (less formal and without the suggested obligation on attendees to dine) is found.

Acoustic Cyber-Routes and the Balladeer

John Burnell has again agreed to continue maintaining the web site. This year we have changed the web site structure to alter the appearance of the web site and make it easier to maintain. The new software also gives a flexible platform for development going forward. Dale Lacey has offered assistance in reviewing our web site structure and content and we hope to take up this offer in the near future. John has suggested that he work with Dale and the new committee on further development and improvement.

Janette Munneke has looked after the desktop publishing and Balladeer editing singlehandedly this year except for when she has been absent. Big thanks to Janette – and to Sue Ikin for standing in when needed by collecting material, and to John Burnell for standing in when needed for the desktop publishing. Thanks as always to Kay and Tony Larsen at Datastream Instant Print for mates rate printing. Sue and Linda Dear have maintained the tradition of stuffing envelopes and posting the Balladeer.

Johan Piribauer is a folkrock artist/singer-songwriter from Arvidsjaur, Lapland, Sweden near the Artic Circle. He has been playing for 20 years as a guitarist in different bands and for about 10 years in a Folkrock-project called "Johan Piribauer & Gruvtolvan". He also performs and tours as a solo artist and with his partner and backing vocalist Maud Rombe. Johan's melodic songs, sung in Swedish, are inspired by Lappish nature and culture. His songs are very varied, from slow ballads to up-tempo rockers, all with a folk feeling. Although he's always been an "underground-artist", many critics have said that Johan is one of the important artists to take Swedish progressive folk-rock from the seventies into the 21st century.

All our Committee members have been enthusiastically involved in club events and it is this help on the night that keeps the club running smoothly – thanks Mike, Shirley, Sue, Sue, Janette and Ruth for another successful year.

And it's good bye from me

As you will know from several messages in the Balladeer and other forums, I have chosen to step down at this AGM. I will leave the post with mixed feelings - a sense of pride for the events that have been run during my term, and for making some popular additions to the club's programme. But also some regret for potential improvements that we either haven't had time for, or haven't had the energy to try. This feeling is not only mine - as evidenced when 5 of my fellow Committee members indicated their preference to step down at this AGM. This regret is the

main reason I want to hand the club over to a new group who can bring some fresh energy without the biases or scepticism that can come from being in an organisation for a long time.

I also feel a growing sense of guilt for not being attentive enough or responsive enough to many groups of people who approach us for many reasons... especially for not taking the time to investigate the musical offerings that many new or unknown performers can bring. I am sure we turn down performers who have good stuff that our members would appreciate - simply because we either don't have time to listen to them and judge properly, or don't have the energy to try and market the unknown performance in a way that will attract an audience.

I am delighted that after some strong hints / suggestions published through the Balladeer and our email newlist, and after some fairly searching discussions with potential Committee members and Officers, a number of people have indicated they will accept nomination for Committee and Officer positions. I wish them luck, good fun and as much support as I can give as we take Acoustic Routes into what is effectively a new era.

Finally thanks to you, our members for continuing to support Acoustic Routes – and to the many of you who have personally thanked me or expressed appreciation and confidence in the work I have done as President.

Concerts at the Museum of Wellington - Review -

I finally shook off the flu and was able to go along to the Sunday afternoon of concerts at the Museum of Wellington City and Sea, superbly organised by Ann MacGregor. The concert venue had shifted to the Board Room this year and this proved to be a terrific venue for the Mary Hubble Traditional songs event I attended on 17 August. I wondered at first about the solo voice in a venue with such a high ceiling, but in her usual style, Mary, ably assisted in parts (pun intended) by Sue Hirst and Ann McChesney, had no trouble making every perfect note heard.

Mary shared with us a number of traditional (mostly) English songs that have influenced her or that she has simply liked over the years, for their melodies and/or the stories they tell. It made for quite an unusual event these days, as acapella singing of traditional material is not as frequently heard in our vicinity as it used to be. As well as the fine

singing, it was a thrill to discover that there are lyrics to a number of tunes I've played for years thinking they were instrumentals (Lovely Joan and Searching for Lambs, for instance); and there was scarcely a dry eye in the house (well, in the front row, at least) after Mary's simply beautiful renditions of some well-kent songs from "the North".

Unfortunately I had to miss the Full Fathom sea shanties, but by the time I arrived in the interval, the place was packed with familiar smiling faces, so I'm guessing that was a great concert, too; altogether a warm place to be on a cold winter Sunday, and if you've missed the series this year, I recommend that you make sure you get to them next year.

Our guests for Friday 12 September are: The B-Side Band



The B-Side Band is a loose collection of Wairarapa musicians growing out of The Living Daylights and The Dodge Brothers. The line up changes from gig to gig and venue to venue but the common factors are the rootsy Americana music and the voices and range of instruments of Bob Cooper-Grundy and Kate Marshall.

Finger picking and slide guitar from Bob (and also some picking and sliding mandolin have crept in lately) and the fiddle, flute and accordion from Kate, backed up by Miles on the stand up bass, Bolly on percussion and more recently Pat McKenna on acoustic guitar and powerful vocals.

The music is still the same mixture of Country, Boogie, Blues, Folk and Rock and Roll with plenty of original songs which may sound oddly familiar and as many familiar songs which may sound kinda odd. The band still pays tribute fairly evenly to Dylan, Hank, Elvis, Robert Johnson and Muddy Waters and Butch Hancock, Steve Earle and Guy Clark.

The B-Side of a record was the bit where the band got to be self indulgent and played what they wanted to play rather than what was likely to sell. This inspired the song which was the title track of the CD released 18 months ago - "Over Yonder" (the 2 sides of a disc Over here and Over Yonder). Listen to the words and you'll get an idea of what the band wants to be about:

"Fire on the Mountain, Blood on the tracks, Nervous breakdowns and Broken Heart attacks
From Waylon to Van Halen from the Bird to the Boss, Over Yonder where the lines all cross."

Farewell to Mark Warren

... troubled soul, inspiring musician ... a banjo player no one made fun of ...

The folk and bluegrass communities were shocked in late June to learn of the death of Mark Warren. Mark was well known and loved by many in the New Zealand acoustic and bluegrass music scenes. Many of us knew that Mark struggled with depression and it is very sad that his many friends could not provide the support he needed.

I came to know Mark only recently – but he was there at many of the festivals and events I attended in recent years – Tahora, Wellington and Auckland Folk Festivals, and despite not living in Wellington he was a regular participant and often guest at the Wellington Bluegrass Society. Recently he moved to Waitarere Beach and for the last couple of years was a regular at the Levin Folk Club. It was his Levin friends who informed the wider folk scene of his untimely death.

Mark was a brilliant – visionary musician. His skills on the banjo inspired people who usually make fun of that instrument – and he adapted it seamlessly into some of the most unexpected musical contexts. A great example of this was his arrangement and performance (along with others) of Dave Brubeck's jazz classic "Take 5". I was privileged to see this twice – first at Laftahfest last New Year, and then a more complete and polished arrangement at the Te Rangi festival in Hawkes Bay in January. Search for "Take 5, Mark Warren" on www.youtube.com to see my home video of this performance. This performance amply demonstrates the "three Ts" – Timing, Technique and Taste, essential qualities he instilled into Catherine (BB) Bowness – his best known student.

It is telling that over 150 people – many from the music community - travelled to Palmerston North from around New Zealand and overseas to pay their last respects to Mark. The funeral, and session after-

ward saw music bring us together as we know it can. Mark's legacy lives on in the playing of BB and our love and support go to his family.

She taught a lot of children the rude versions of songs and was an arch heckler. We like to think of her heckling in heaven and giving St Peter a hard time (she was brought up

Those of us who have been around a while will remember Cynthia Hawkins (aka Lady "Bloody" Cynthia), former stalwart of the Christchurch folk scene. Many of the "old brigade" throughout the country will have fond memories of her, heckling from the back row of concerts or regally entering the box at the State Opera House to accept the "adulation" of the crowd downstairs. She was a wonderful character. May she rest in peace. *Sue Harkness*

World mourns Dubliners' Ronnie Drew, 'King of Ireland'

The leader of the Irish folk group the Dubliners died at age 73 Saturday 16 August after a lengthy bout with cancer.

Famed for a voice described as sounding like coal being crushed under a door, Drew's booming vocals

and bushy beard - along with those of his fellow Dubliners band mates - became the image most associated with the resurgence of Irish folk in the '60s and '70s. Drew - labeled "The King of Ireland" by Bono and posthumously referred to as "the last of the Irish rovers" - was laid to rest next to his late wife after a two-day wake in County Wicklow. *Bill Burke, AP*

just adapting a few songs from Howard Shore's film soundtrack, Asni com-
bines Medieval songs, dance music not only from Ireland and Scotland, but
from Finland and neighbouring Estonia, and even from as far afield as Spain
and Western Africa, as well as original tunes inspired by texts from Tolkien's
book on her new album.
